
Center for Applied

Copenhagen, Denmark.



CApE's aim is to draw on the humanities' great reservoirs of knowledge of ethics, imagination, and cultural values to respond to the imminent crisis, to reconceptualise current ecological thinking, and to engage with stakeholders in the pursuit of new, applied routes towards sustainable transition. Many of the insights that characterise Scandinavian models of sustainability governance demonstrate that better ways of life on this planet are possible.



EcologicArt: a context



At the end of the 19th century, new spiritual and religious movements emerged despite secularization, and the arts came under their influence. Some of these movements integrated nature into their viewpoint. Moreover, the last century witnessed the rise of land art and artists' interest in ecological issues. Is the contemporary artistic practice infused with a secular spiritual approach to nature and life?

The concept of nature has affected the arts and many religions. This workshop aimed to explore the connection between artistic practices and spiritual beliefs related to nature: these last are, for example, ecospirituality and religious naturalism.



How is the experience of ecological concerns processed in art and literature?

Connecting Immaterialities

Behind the tangible aspect of the environmental crisis, our present confronts us with more invisible factors. This workshop explored the connection between two immaterial cultural elements that nevertheless may impact the material world: aesthetics and spirituality.

Reflecting on this connection may unveil specific worldviews linked to ecological artistic practices, which may better support the communication of unexpressed anxieties and mobilise action.












MICKEY GJERRIS

Mickey Gjerris (1969), M.Th., PhD, asssociate professor in bioethics at the Faculty of Science, University of Copenhagen. Since 2004 researching different aspects of the ethical relationship between humans and nature, focusing on areas such as animals, agriculture, biotechnology, climate change and biodiversity. He has published +50 peer reviewed papers and +10 books. From 2010-2016 he was member of the Danish Ethical Council, an advisory body to the Danish Parliament, he has given several keynote lecturers at international conferences and is an often-used speaker at public events and often-used expert in Danish media.


BIRGITTE KIRKHOFF

Birgitte Kirkhoff established Being in Practice in 2021. In courses, retreats, and as mentor, she connects the dots between art, ecology, and spirituality towards conscious being and practice. Currently, she works on a book about Spiritual Ecology, told through 12 different people's practices. Birgitte is an Art Historian and has worked as a gallerist, a curator, and a director. In 2012-14, she curated an exhibition series within the realm of New Materialism, called Materiality 1-3 (on things and memory, soil and time, and on consciousness). Being in Practice has its roots in this work. Her final position was Director at Museum of Contemporary Art, Roskilde, 2014-2021. As part of the Great Resignation, she wanted to dedicate her life to matters closer to the heart and guit.
